Good afternoon, my name is Nicholas Ristaino and I am writing in support of putting affordable housing at the Sherburne School site, as well as other sites across Portsmouth. First of all, congratulations on your recent election victory. It is a clear sign the citizens of Portsmouth trust you with addressing the pressing needs of our community, one of which is the insufficient housing options for people of modest means. According to NH Housing, the state currently has a shortfall of over 20,000 housing units. They predict that by 2030 we will need 60,000 more housing units. Every community must do their part, including Portsmouth.

According to the NH Zoning Atlas, up to 40% of our city is defined as a "non-buildable area" - which is fine, we need wooded areas to sequester carbon and wetlands to absorb our much more intense rainfall. This does limit how many parcels across town can be converted to affordable housing to address our dire housing shortage. The Sherburne site is one of a few the council has looked at for such a purpose, and it is perfect for apartments for our future friends and neighbors. It is a site with easy access to I-95, Pease, and route 33 - while we need more public transit and safe bike lanes as well - it offers easy access for commuters to get to work. The Lister Academy is vacating the site and if left to decay the school - which my siblings attended - would fall into disrepair. Instead, it should be put to good use and there are no other uses better than housing people that need it.

Other sites should also be converted to affordable housing, it is something we sorely need. Gentrification increasingly prices out moderate and lower income individuals, making Portsmouth a city increasingly only for the wealthy. This is not healthy for our society. It breeds myopia and provincialism. Meanwhile, socioeconomic diversity opens minds, broadens perspectives, and enhances all of our lives. Some may complain about the "character" of Pannaway Manor" somehow being impacted by affordable housing. The neighborhood itself was built as workforce housing, nothing could be more in character than continuing to keep the door open to working class people and their families.

When Pannaway Manor was built, the homes had restrictive covenants. That locked out of our neighborhood people who should have had a fair shot at calling the Port City home. We cannot change what happened in the past, but we can make the future better for our future neighbors. We should build affordable housing at the old Sherburne school site. We should build affordable housing at other sites across town. Right now, the "city of the open door" is slammed shut for middle and lower income individuals. Thank you for using Portsmouth Listens to solicit feedback from citizens - professional and health obligations prevent me from participating, but I'd like to make my opinions known to you. In 2024, I hope the City Council I have supported with my vote can deliver the housing necessary to open that door for others. Thank you for your commitment to public service!
