A Letter from the City Manager



To the Citizens of Portsmouth,

I am pleased to present the Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the year ended June 30, 2022. This report, prepared for the non-financial reader, contains valuable information to share how the City is doing from a financial perspective. It highlights various programs, along with accolades, which affirm why Portsmouth is a great place to live, play, work and visit. This PAFR represents our commitment to maintaining clear and consistent communication with you as we look to stay connected and engaged.

This report documents how City Council policies are implemented as a means to achieve established goals for taxpayers and to clearly explain the financial strategies and tactics applied to accomplish that work. Thanks to long-standing financial policies that have served us well and continue to provide the foundation for the City's AAA bond rating with Standard & Poor's, I am pleased to report that Portsmouth once again finished the fiscal year in strong financial position.

In making strategic financial decisions such as rate stabilization policies, the timing of bonding and holding off on rate increases and property tax revaluations, Portsmouth taxpayers were insulated from increases seen in other communities. These tactics were especially critical in FY22, where the supply chain and contractor availability made it prudent to advance projects that could be realized and adjust those that could not. Careful examination of each Department's budget requests, opportunistic use of ARPA and other COVID-relief funds and grants, and the implementation of practical efficiencies wherever possible, allowed us to keep the tax rate in check while accomplishing once-in-a-lifetime tasks, notably the acquisition of the Community Campus that will pay benefits to Portsmouth citizens for generations to come.

The City, specifically our Finance Department, were again recognized for their excellence in financial reporting. The Government Finance Officers Association awarded its Triple Crown to commend the Department for the clarity and professionalism of the City Budget, the Popular Annual Financial Report and the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report. Our priority is to report the budget and the City's financial affairs to taxpayers in a transparent and easily-understood manner, and to provide extensive detail through links to online documents and guides for those who wish to understand in greater detail how City finances work.

On behalf of the Finance Team led by Director Judie Belanger, I am proud to work in support of the City Council's focus on a culture of cost management among all employees while maintaining the same level of services that directly support our high quality of life here in the great City of Portsmouth.

I am grateful to the City Department Heads and their staff who worked to prepare budgets that allowed us to deliver City services diligently and faithfully. We continue to withstand the effects of global economic uncertainty, and have been able to endure the pressures thanks in large part to the City's longstanding, financial practices and to the professional, loyal, hard-working and dedicated City staff. It is my honor to be the leader of this exceptional organization.

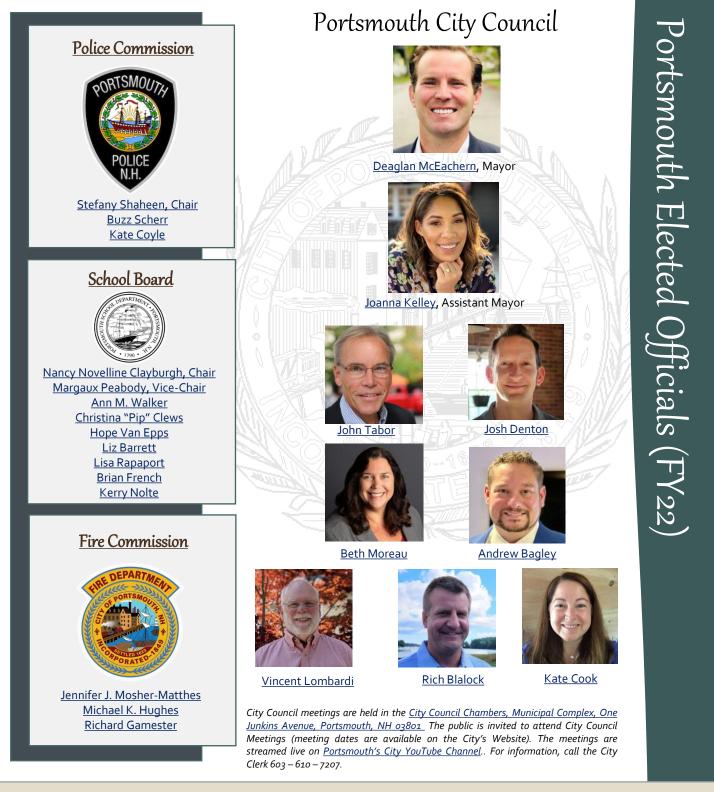

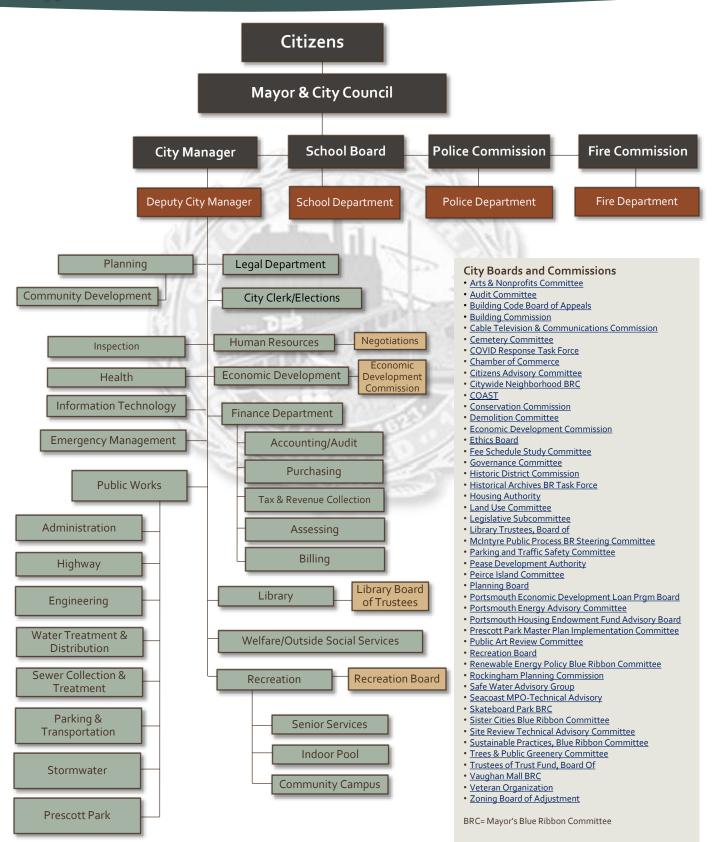

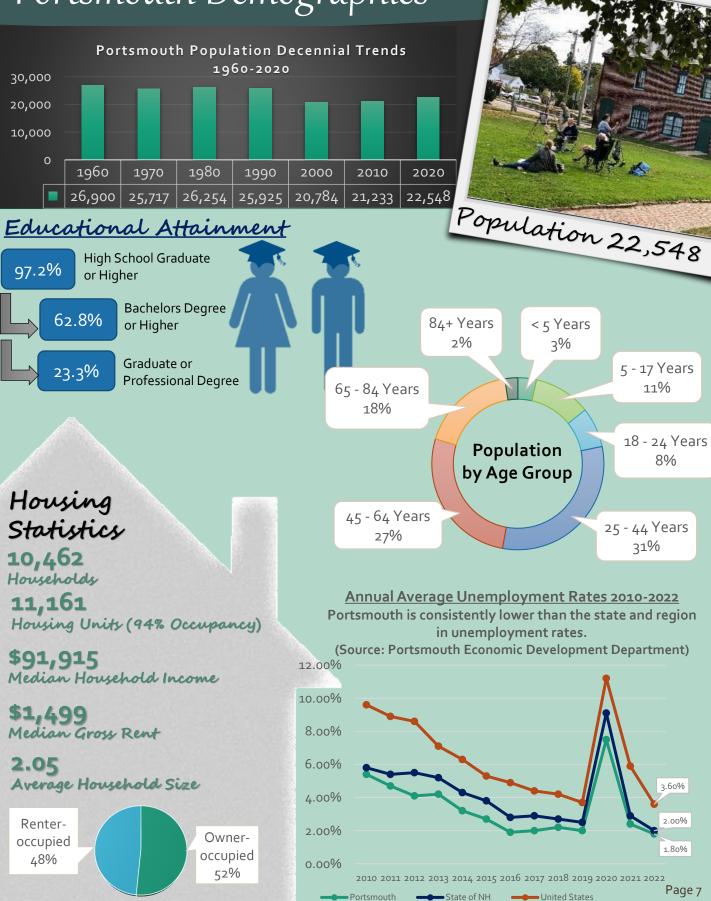

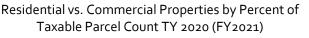

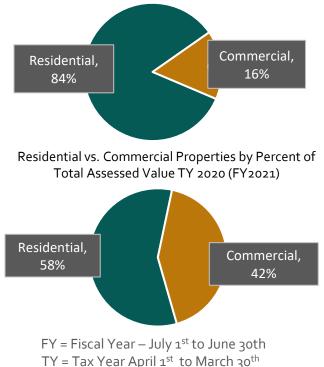

<u>Residential Vs. Commercial</u> Important Numbers

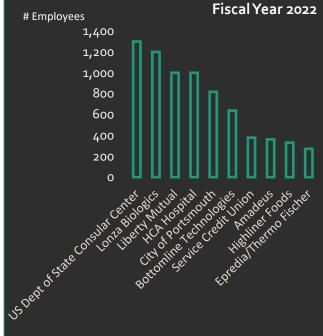

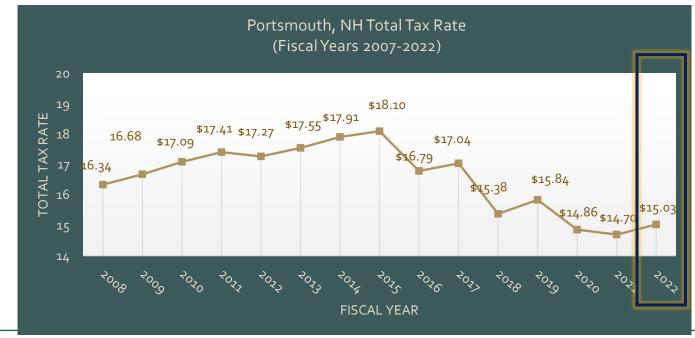

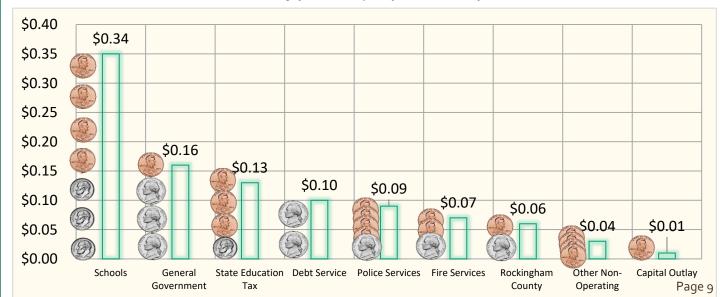

Property Tax Levy, Assessments, and Equalization

Property Tax Levy and Taxes

The City Council annually adopts a budget that is made up of program-related operating and non-operating appropriations. Estimated Revenues (from fees/fines/etc.) are then subtracted from the annual appropriations resulting in a Tax Levy.

<u>The Tax Levy is the amount of money that the City</u> will have to raise through property taxes.

The Tax Rate is set annually in the fall by the State of New Hampshire. Once the tax rate is set, the formula to calculate what your property tax is as follows . . .

Property Assessment ÷ 1,000 X Tax Rate

= Property Taxes

Property Assessments

Property Assessments, a value placed on each property in the City, are based on the market value and qualified comparable sales for each individual property as well as other contributing factors as of April 1st of each year. The State of New Hampshire relies on the assessment of values of properties at market value to attain fairness and equality to ensure the tax burden is proportionally spread across all property types.

Equalized Tax Rate

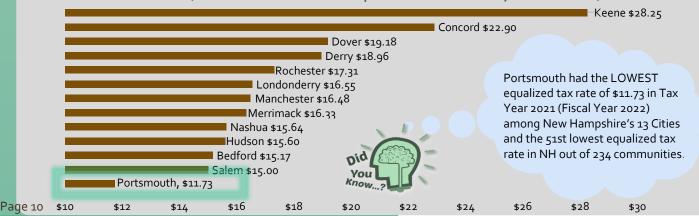
What is Equalization?

Each year the New Hampshire State Department of Revenue Administration (DRA), performs a statistical study of all of the state's municipal valuations. The study utilizes sales data to adjust all municipalities to 100% market value. This process is called equalization.

How is Equalization Used?

The State of New Hampshire utilizes the Equalized Value of each Town or City in order to proportionately share common tax burdens such as: County Taxes and State Education Property Tax.

Abatement Process

Property owners who wish to contest their assessments may request a review of their value by filing an <u>abatement</u> <u>application</u> with the Assessing Department.

- March 1st is the deadline to file the abatement application with the Assessor. The application can be found online. The Assessing Department must issue a response no later than July 1st.
- Property owners wishing to appeal the Assessing Department's decision can file with either the NH Board of Tax and Land Appeals or Rockingham County Superior court by September 1st.

The City's first Climate Action Plan is getting ready to kick off this December with two major phases. The first phase will include a campaign of outreach and engagement between the plan consultant, City staff, volunteers, committees, community members and local businesses. Specifically, this first phase will include workshops, surveys and outreach that will aim to prioritize the community's climate adaptation and mitigation needs. In the second phase, working with both the community and the municipality, the Climate Action Plan consultant team will gather community data and utilize their experience to develop short and long term adaptation goals tailored to our community. They will also help the City find funding opportunities, suggest regulation and ordinance changes or additions, and will help to facilitate measureable goals as we continue on this journey to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in Portsmouth.

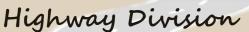

As the City of Portsmouth's Director of Finance and Administration, I am pleased to present the City of Portsmouth's seventh Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022. The PAFR is intended to increase knowledge throughout the community of Portsmouth's financial condition through the use of a readily accessible and easily understandable report.

This report extracts and summarizes financial information from the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) that may be most informative to the citizenry of Portsmouth, and other interested parties and is not intended to conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). The PAFR provides pertinent information regarding expenditures, revenues, fund balance, debt service and capital asset investments for Governmental and Proprietary Funds. It does not include information on all of the city's Funds or Component Units. The ACFR is prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and includes additional financial statements, note disclosures and required supplemental information, citywide initiatives, accomplishments and statistical data.

The City's financial activities in total are made up of two classifications:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS:

- General Fund---Account for all general operating expenditures and revenues. This is the City's largest fund and primarily funded from property taxes.
- Special Revenue Funds---Proceeds of specific revenue sources that are restricted for a specific purpose.
- Capital Funds---CIP projects for City infrastructure improvements.
- Debt Service Funds---Principal and interest payments on a special assessment bond.
- Permanent Funds---Resources that are restricted to the extent that only earnings and not principal may be used for purposes that supports programs for the benefit of the government or citizenry.

BUSINESS-TYPE OR ENTERPRISE FUNDS:

- > Water Fund---Production, delivery and storage of safe water supported primarily with user fees.
- Sewer Fund---Collection, transportation and treatment of wastewater supported primarily with user fees.

Helpful Financial Terms

Abatement	An official reduction or elimination of one's assessed valuation after completion of the original assessed value.
Accrual Basis of Accounting	A basis of accounting in which revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned, and expenses are recognized in the period in which they are incurred.
Appropriation	An authorization granted by a legislative body to make expenditures and incur obligations for specific purpose.
Assessed Valuation	The fair market value placed upon real and personal property by the city as the basis for levying property taxes.
Authorized Unissued Debt	Amount of an adopted borrowing resolution that has not actually been issued. This amount is utilized when calculating legal debt limits.
Bond Premium	An amount that the underwriter provides to the issuer at the closing of bonds in addition to the principal (par) amount borrowed.
Capital Assets	Land, improvements to land, easements, building, building improvements, vehicles, machinery, equipment, and all other tangible or intangible assets that are used in operations and that have initial useful lives extending beyond a single reporting period.
Deferred Inflows and Outflows of Resources	Represents acquisition (inflows) and consumption (outflows) that are applicable to future reporting periods.
Enterprise Funds	Account for the financing of services to the general public whereby all or most of the operating expenses involved are recorded in the form of charges to users of such services. The Enterprise Funds consist of the Water Fund and the Sewer Fund.
Fund Balance	 The excess of an entity's assets over its liabilities also known as excess revenues over expenditures or net assets. Fund Balance can be further segmented as follows: Non-spendable – Represents fund balance not available to be spent or legally required to be maintained intact. Restricted – Represents fund balance that is restricted by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments. Committed – Self-imposed limitations set in place prior to the end of the period. Assigned – Represents fund balance utilized in subsequent periods for pay-as-you capital projects and on-time, non-recurring expenditures. Unassigned – Represents fund balance that is available for any purpose.
General Fund	Chief operating fund of the government.
Net Position	Reflects the City's net worth. Net Position = Assets (+) Deferred Outflows (-) Liabilities (-) Deferred Inflows.
Overlay	An appropriation to fund potential tax abatements.
Proprietary Funds	Funds used for business-like activities, usually operate on an accrual basis of accounting. Proprietary funds include Enterprise and Internal service funds.
State Revolving Loan Fund (SRF)	A fund administered by the State for the purpose of providing low- interest loans for investments in water and sanitation infrastructure.









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Financial Position - Statement of Net Position

Net Position \$267.8 Million

Statement of Net Position presents information on all of the City fund's assets and liabilities, deferred inflow/outflows of resources, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator whether the City's financial position is improving or deteriorating.

At the close of the fiscal year, the City's total net position of \$267.8 million represents an increase of \$21.4 million or 8.7% from FY21.

Net Investment in Capital Assets is the largest portion of net position and reflects our investment in capital assets (e.g. land, buildings, machinery and equipment); less any related debt used to acquire the assets that is still outstanding. As of year-end, net investment in capital assets is \$268.5 million, an increase of \$17.5 million from FY2021. These capital assets are used to provide services to citizens.

Restricted Net Position of \$15.7 million represents 6% of resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used.

Unrestricted Net Position is the remaining amount of the net position not restricted for a specific purpose. There are two reporting mandates from Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) 1) \$87.6 million of net pension liability representing the City's share of the New Hampshire Retirement System's unfunded liability and 2) \$17.4 million for Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) liabilities. This resulted in an ending balance in Unrestricted Net Position of a negative \$16.4 million. [Detailed information regarding these liabilities can be found in notes 21 and 22 (pages 83-94) of the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2022 ACFR].

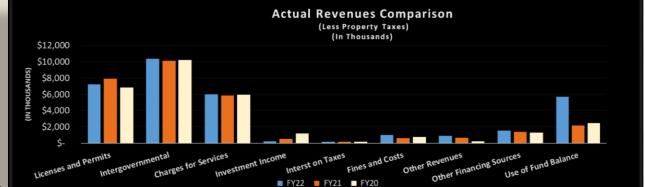

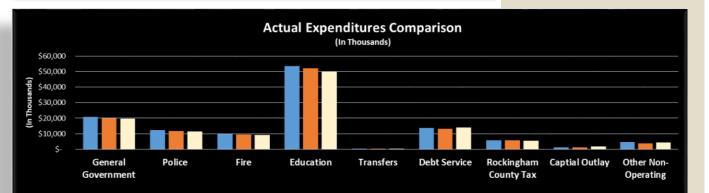

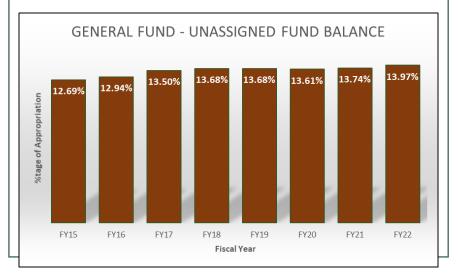

The General Fund balance sheet is prepared using current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting, meaning no longterm assets or liabilities are reported on this balance sheet.

Fund Balance is the excess of an entity's assets over its liabilities.

Total Fund Balance of \$50,184,611 or 39.7% of appropriations, represents an increase of \$1,569,290 or 3.23% from FY21.

Unassigned Fund Balance Ordinance

The Unassigned portion of the fund balance represents expendable available resources that can be spent for future needs.

City Council adopted in Fiscal Year 1998 the "Unassigned Fund Balance Ordinance" and amended in fiscal year 2013 which mandates that the City will maintain an unassigned fund balance of between 10% and 17% of general fund appropriations.

Unassigned fund balance at the end of the fiscal year was \$17,156,799 or 13.57% of the final general fund budget. This is an increase of \$792,801 or 4.84% from prior year.

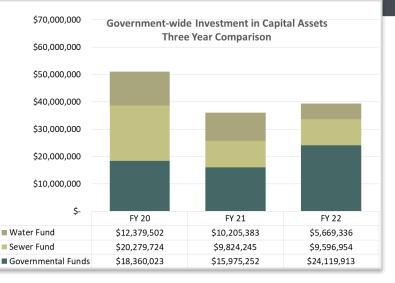

Long-term Debt

The City's debt for Governmental activity totaled \$261.9 Million (excluding unamortized premium.) This represents a \$75.8 million increase over the last year's total debt of \$186 million. The net increase is primarily attributable to:

- > Reduction of outstanding debt principal of \$18.2 million
- > Issuance of General Obligation (GO) bonds and refinancing callable bonds of \$26.9 million
- The permanent financing of the State Revolving Fund Loan (SRF) of \$76.7 million for the Peirce Island Wastewater Treatment Facility

Enterprise Funds – Water & Sewer Funds

Did you know? The City manages a water and wastewater (sewer) utility system? These utilities are Enterprise Funds which establishes a separate accounting and financial reporting mechanism for municipal services for which a fee is charged in exchange for goods and/or services. Each of these Enterprise Funds are accounted for separately.

What area does the City service?

The Water fund operates and maintains water production, water storage and water distribution servicing Portsmouth, Greenland, New Castle, Newington and portions of Durham, Madbury and Rye.

How is my water & sewer rate established?

The City's water and sewer rate structure is a two tiered inclining rate, meaning the first 10 units (a unit of 100 cubic feet of water or 748 gallons) of water consumed each month is billed using one rate, and water consumed greater than 10 units per month is billed at a higher rate. Since the large volume users have a greater impact on the water system, a second tier at the higher rate captures the additional costs incurred to serve them.

Does the City allow for Irrigation meters? YES!

The City's allows for irrigation meters for both residential and commercial customers. Please call Public Works at (603) 766-1443 and we will be happy to assist.

Why is there a meter charge on my monthly

bill? The monthly meter charge is for ongoing maintenance and service of meters installed on the property and is based on the service size. The typical residential meter is 5/8" and is \$4.95/month.

FY22 SEWER RATES

The Sewer Fund operates the Collection and Treatment of wastewater. Sewer rates are based on water consumption per month.

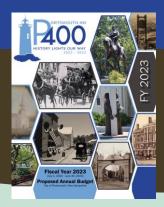

The total net position for the Water and Sewer Funds at the end of the year increased by \$5.9 million for a total of \$140.5 million. The Water Fund increased by \$1.5 million and the Sewer Fund increased by \$4.4 million. Key elements of the changes are:

- Operating revenues over operating expenses of \$4.5 million represent a decrease of \$3,610 from the prior year. Charges for services in the business-type activities experienced and increase of \$502,084. The Water Fund experienced an increase in operating revenues of \$81,664 or .8% and the Sewer Fund experienced an increase in operating revenues of \$551,064 or 3%, both primarily as a result of rate increases.
- Non-operating revenues of \$775,310 represent a decrease of \$102,495 primarily due to a decrease in investment income.
- Non-operating expenses, interest expense, increased by \$315,186 to \$4.3 million.
- Capital grants and contributions of \$5.3 million represent a decrease of \$420,088 primarily due to a reduction of contributions of \$4.5 million made from the Air Force for well and water source projects at Pease and an increase in sewer capital contributions of \$4.1 million from the state forgiveness of principal debt on a SFR loan for the Peirce Island Wastewater Treatment Facility.

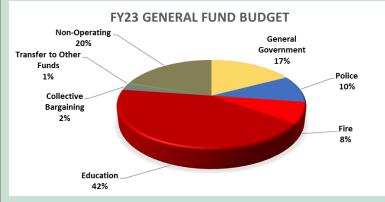
At the time of publication of the PAFR for year ending June 30, 2022, Fiscal Year 2023 is underway and the budget document is available for review at the Public Library, City Clerk's office as well as on the City's website. The document describes the strategy implemented to continue the services, critical infrastructure needs, and fiscal stability of the City. The tax rate approved by the Department of Revenue Administration is \$15.20 per \$1,000 of assessed value. 17¢

The FY23 Final Budget of \$132,274,911 includes one supplemental appropriation:

\$500,000 for Deer Street Associates Settlement

Both the Water and Sewer Division user rates have been set based on a two-tier inclining rate block structure based on units of water consumed. One unit is equal to 100 cubic feet or 748 gallons of water.

The FY23 water user rates reflect a 3% increase from FY22.

First 10 units of water consumed per month increased from \$4.40 to \$4.54.

Over 10 units per month increased from \$5.30 to \$5.46.

Irrigation rates are based on a three-tier inclining rate structure.

- First 10 units of water consumed \$5.46/unit
- 10 units up to 20 units consumed \$10.30/unit
- Above 20 units consumed \$12.71/unit

The FY₂₃ sewer user rates reflect a 6% increase from the FY₂₂ rates.

First 10 units of water consumed per month increased from \$14.89 to \$15.78.

Over 10 units per month increased from \$16.38 to \$17.36 per unit.

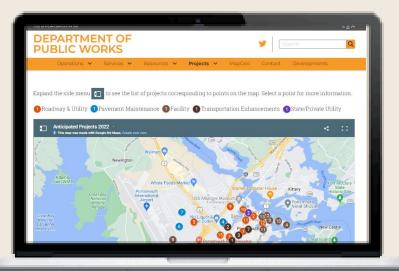

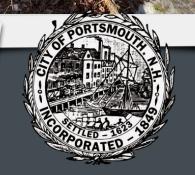
